This art nouveau-themed restaurant is the ideal place for special occasions.

There is also a 24-seater cinema decorated in 1930s style. It is for the exclusive use of guests of The Orient, screening anything from their library of 1 500 movies to the latest blockbusters.

Small private museums found within the confines of the property show-case the owners' passion for local art. Another unique feature is a suite for disabled visitors.

In the future, expect a world-class spa and amphitheatre that will host plays, light music festivals and many other surprises. Watch this space!

MALARIA: What you need to know - and do

Malaria is one of the most serious tropical diseases in the world - and can be fatal if not diagnosed and treated at an early stage Preventing mosquito bites is the most important and effective way to prevent malaria Measures to prevent mosquito bites should always be taken in a malaria risk area - even if anti-malarial drugs are being taken Remember that malaria carrying mosquitoes feed mainly between dusk and dawn - both indoors and outdoors

Contact with mosquitoes may be minimised by taking the following precautions:

- Wear long sleeves, socks and trousers, preferably of light colour, if venturing out in the evening
- Apply Tabard, which is an insect repellent containing DEET. This is the most effective compound to ward off mosquitoes
- Burn Tabard Citronella Candles
- Keep all windows and doors closed at night
- Sleep under a mosquito net



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
